On February 5th, IB Science students displayed the results of their Group 4 science investigations in a group session held after school in the North Commons. Each year, IB students, as part of their science class choice, complete a project referred to as their Group 4 project: one of the IB internal assessments for science. The Group 4 designation refers to the

> fact that Experimental Science is the 4th Subject Group of the IB curriculum that all IB students must complete.

The Group 4 project includes all of the IB sciences. The project involves

designing, conducting, and analyzing an experiment on a topic of their choice, relate to the overall topic.



This year's topic was "Sustainability" and students share the results of their research in a poster session format. As part of a peer review, all those attending were asked to critique the displays, evaluating them on organization, visual format, and science content. They could also comment on anything they thought was especially positive about the project.

Coordinator's Corner

In Recognition of ...

In recognition of Elliot Eisner (1933-2014), Stanford professor and educator of the arts as well as the continued efforts of Douglas County teachers to pursue what is most meaningful in education:

Creation involves risk-taking. Sometimes creating requires overcoming the anxiety that what one creates might not correspond to what one envisioned. Sometimes it requires moving past a concern that as others judge one's portrayal they judge, by extension, one's identity. Sometimes it requires using materials that one has little or no familiarity with. Sometimes it requires encountering new ideas and reaching previously unconsidered conclusions. It may even require that a creator, after expressing an initial impulse or a sudden realization, face the responsibility of asking questions: "What does this mean? What comes next? Where can I go from here?" Aesthetic education, committed to encouraging students to recognize that they possess the power to create themselves must consequently commit to encouraging students to take risks. Nothing about aesthetic education, an education of creation and the experience of perpetual becoming, is grounded in certainty.

Elliot Eisner in *Arts and the Creation of Mind* reminds his readers that: "The work of art is a process that culminates in a new art form. That art form is the recreation of the Individual...the development of the human consciousness." (p.241) The self as a work of art is a perspective that can easily be made into a superficial adoption of borrowed forms, from the application of makeup and the donning of fashionable clothes to the reiteration of previously heard ideas and the offering of expected perspectives. A "new art form," the formation of an authentic self requires the taking of risks. Overcoming risks offers what lies at the heart of an aesthetic education, what Eisner calls "the

celebration of diversity, individuality, and surprise." Pedagogically, Eisner says, achieving this celebration requires helping "youngsters learn how to relinquish control in order to find new options in their work." (p.236) Aesthetic lessons offer opportunities for students to see how artists have embraced uncertainty in order to produce enduring works while providing students with the opportunity to create their own works in environments that value "diversity, individuality and surprise." Aesthetic lessons encourage students to find the unexpected, to consider the possible and to produce works in ways that are original and exploratory.

The artist and the aesthetically minded teacher remain perpetually aware of the power that art has to bridge the gap between thought and creation.

Teachers use conversations in order to encourage students to understand education as process, as steps to further creation and as a basis for considering the power of thought. Aesthetically minded teachers make countless decisions when they walk into the classroom about what is being taught and how it is being approached. The power of the instantaneous decision in teaching is the power of the art of teaching; it is the risk-taking teachers must recognize in their practice in order to offer a genuine invitation to students to take risks of their own.

Providing a risk free environment in education constitutes an abdication of responsibility. Throughout 3000 years of Egyptian art few risks were taken for fear of upsetting the balance so valued by tradition and the gods. Ancient Egyptian art is filled with meaning but lacks innovation and individuality. It lacks surprise. Aesthetic education cannot fear the wrath of gods or the sterility of standardized tests; an education infused with risk exists as an invitation to explore, to create and to construct, to "approach unfamiliar situations with courage and forethought."

Class of 2016 IB Orientation & IB Alumni Panel

On Thursday evening January 9th, 10th grade students and parents were treated to an informative and inspiring IB orientation and alumni panel presentation.

Dr. Fleet began by welcoming students, parents and the IB grad panel and outlining the agenda for the evening which would offer two important elements: a detailed description of the core requirements of the IB program, followed by a special opportunity to hear from six DCHS graduates and IB program alumni who would share their experiences, thoughts and benefits of the IB program.

Dr. Fleet spoke on the **Theory of** Knowledge (TOK) requirement. TOK is an evening class offered during the 2nd semester of the student's junior year. It is a class designed to encourage students to reflect on the nature of knowledge by critically examining different ways of knowing (perception, emotion, language and reason) and different kinds of knowledge (scientific, artistic, mathematical and historical). It teaches students to consider who they are as a learner, to realize the role they play in their own thoughts, as a student, and in the world. It also focuses on the relationship the student has with him/herself and with others and teaches students how to poll their learning based on their own

experiences. Students are required to keep a journal of day to day reflections and experiences for the duration of the class.

Next Mr. Umbach spoke about the Extended Essay (EE) which as part of the IB program sets students apart as they prepare for and attend college. EE is a requirement for students to engage in independent research through an in-depth study of questions relating to one of the subjects they are studying. Students can choose a topic from 27 possible subject areas. The process begins during the 2nd semester of their junior year. Students will work on their EE over the summer between their junior and senior year, come back to school senior year with a draft of their essay and complete the essay just prior to the end of October. Students must select an advisor who will work with them to select a topic and connect to during the process. A workshop will be held over the summer months providing access to the University of Denver Auraria campus research library. This unique process promotes a high level of research and prepares students for university-level writing. Students are encouraged to select their EE advisor early in the process to ensure that their preferred advisor has availability. Students are highly encouraged to select a topic that they are passionate about.

Then, Mrs. Clever addressed the



Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) requirement of the IB program and categorized it as one of the most exciting portions of the IB program! CAS requires that students actively learn from the experience of doing real tasks beyond the classroom. In short, the CAS requirement includes 150 hours of doing what you choose and is designed to get the student out of the classroom to explore the world. Students create their own programs, follow their passions and put them to action. CAS begins during the summer of sophomore year and is completed by



The overall highlight of the evening came as Mr. Umbach facilitated a conversation with the IB grads as they shared their insights, recommendations and reflections of the IB program and what it has meant to them in terms of their learning, student experience and benefits provided to them with their current universities.

The grads shared that while the IB program is challenging and requires a strong commitment of organization and time, they were all involved in extra-curricular activities including participation in sports and clubs and were able to successfully manage their schedules and schoolwork along the way. Princeton Review Practice ACT/SAT Testing

On Saturday morning, February 8th 140 students took part in the Princeton Review Practice Exams. The students chose from three tests; ACT, SAT and Princeton Review Assessment (PRA). The exams will be graded and scores returned to the students. The students kept their test booklets so they could refer to them while reviewing their test scores.

While the students took the tests, their parents were invited to attend three different presentations. The presentations lasted one hour. Each was given 3 times during the morning, giving a parent the chance to participate in all of the presentations.

One presentation was from Sara Tierney of Mosaic Admissions, LLC. Mosaic Admissions helps students with every step of the college application process, including developing an overall application strategy, choosing "best fit" colleges, preparing for campus visits, crafting compelling essays, and preparing for admissions interviews. Sara discussed the admission process for each of the four years of high school. In the

freshman year, the student must stretch themselves academically, including AP and/or honor courses. In the sophomore year, the focus needs to be on quality extracurricular activities. In the junior year, a student must maintain strong grades in challenging courses. The student will take the SAT test and ACT test. The student should identify several teachers for college admissions recommendations. In the senior year, a student must strive for "As". Take the SAT test or ACT test, if needed,

Another presentation was from Nicholas West-Miles of The Princeton Review. The Princeton Review is a national college readiness and test preparation company, offering courses, private tutoring, admissions consulting, online resources and printed books.
