The Group 4 designation refers to the

Class of 2017 IB Orientation & IB Alumni Panel

On January 8th, IB had their annual 10th grade CAS/TOK/EE Graduation Panel Meeting. The first speaker was Dr. Steve Fleet. He discussed how sophomore year is a tricky year for IB high school students because they need to decide if they are going to move forward with the IB Diploma.

TOK represents the Theory of Knowledge. Graduating IB students liked the class because it has encouraged them to really "think". The TOK night class works well for 11th and 12th grade students, allowing them a getaway from their busy day of high school. The class is scheduled the last semester of junior year and the first semester of senior year. Every year the class is different. It is a class designed to encourage students to reflect on the nature of knowledge by critically examining different ways of knowing (perception, emotion, language and reason) and different kinds of knowledge (scientific, artistic, mathematical and historical). It teaches students to consider who they are as a learner, to realize the role they play in their own thoughts, as a student, and the world. In TOK, you are creating and discovering yourself.

Previous parents of IB students have provided feedback to Dr. Steve Fleet complimenting the TOK class. The parents felt it opened up their student to listening to new ideas. The TOK class is fortunate to have very experienced teachers in this subject matter and Mr. Umbach comes back from retirement each year to teach the class.

Mrs. Kim Clever and Mrs. Leah Yates love being involved in the IB program and they continue to teach CAS Projects and Extended Essay. Mrs. Clever works on topics that students are passionate about. She is able to see students pick their journey in IB and she is excited to experience the growth within a student.

CAS is Creativity, Action and Service. CAS requires that students learn from the experience of doing real tasks beyond the



classroom. In short, the CAS requirement includes 150 hours of doing what you choose and is designed to get the student out of the classroom to explore the world. Students create their own programs, follow their passions and put them to action. CAS begins during the summer of sophomore year and is completed by March of the student's senior year. DCSD requires students to have 20 hours of community service, but please note that this is not in addition to CAS, it is included in the 150 hour CAS requirement. An example of a project that was completed in the past was building an archery range in Castle Rock and a clothing closet developed to give students in need clothing.

CAS aims for learners to provide an outlet to work outside the student's box. Examples that are not CAS worthy are activities in which you are paid and activities involving the teaching of religion for example, vacation bible school. An example of an action activity is a marathon, or climbing a 14er in Colorado





Dr. Leslie Walden

Dr. Walden is originally from Georgia. She moved to Colorado for her position with Douglas County High School as Director of the IB Dance Program in August 2013. In addition to the IB dance classes, and other dance courses at DCHS, Dr. Walden also teaches Theatre 1, team teaches with theatre faculty in Production, and choreographs the musicals. Dr. Walden has been teaching dance for 30 years, primarily in college and university programs such as the University of Georgia, Smith College, and Western Kentucky University, Her choreography has been performed at the Kennedy Center, Alaska Dance Theatre, Anchorage Opera, SunTrust Plaza Gallery, Atlanta, Lyndon House Arts Center, Athens, Georgia and other performance venues. Dr. Walden has had the good fortune to study and work with some of the leading figures in 20th century dance, such as Helen McGehee (lead Martha Graham dancer), Cliff Keuter (Paul Taylor Dance Company), Anna Halprin, and Gemze deLappe.





George Balanchine walked into the restaurant she was working in (to pay the bills) and she scrambled to declare "I've got that table"! Dr. Walden's career focused mainly on modern and jazz, as a professional dancer performing in the Bay Area, New York, and resorts around the world. Higher education extended her training and knowledge in dance via her undergraduate degree from Randolph-Macon Woman's College (1978), her Masters from San Jose State (1988) and her Doctorate from Temple (1998), all three in dance. Dr. Walden's Masters thesis on Pina Bausch was awarded most outstanding thesis in the College of Arts and Humanities. Her dissertation investigated the inclusion of somatics in dance education. All of these dance experiences have provided a wonderfully complex lens through which her own perspectives take shape, and enable her to invite her students to explore.

The IBDP program is an exhilarating academic experience for everyone involved. With her many years of college teaching, Dr. Walden is so impressed by the DCHS IB students, and the dance students especially. Their thirst for creative experimentation and scholarly investigation, combined with their values for academic excellence, make her job one of the most fulfilling she has had in her career. Dr. Walden loves teaching these students, witnessing them take risks, to discover and translate what they explore into tangible products, and interact with peers and other teachers. The IB program at DC is such a supportive network. Dr. Walden feels very fortunate to be part of this unique school and the IB Dance Program - which was one of the first in the country and is the only one of its kind in Colorado.



On a personal note, Dr. Walden's 4 legged friend Nellie is her family member, a joyous cockapoo with the spirit of unconditional love. Her pastimes when not teaching or dancing are cooking, biking, swimming and hiking. Dr. Walden enjoys cooking and sees it as a type of choreography. There is an idea, a goal, and aesthetic to the dish, the ingredients need to come together and make a statement of some sort and ultimately taste great and maybe win over your dinner guests, or at least fill your empty stomach with a smile. Dr. Walden's love and comfort amidst the ocean and water suggests the possibility she may be part amphibian. She owns a home on an island in the Atlantic Ocean that she misses and hopes to return too. Meanwhile, the Rockies are exquisite and mysterious to Dr. Walden. She enjoys discovering this new landscape and the amazing light here. Much of her choreography is inspired from nature ~ It feeds her. And then there is always a new dance project brewing... currently it is inspired from a high school friend, internationally renown artist Bo Bartlett. His themes of nostalgia and images of people, friends, family, place resonate with Dr. Walden. She tries to impart important messages to her students. Dr. Walden's best friends to date she has known since she was in 7th grade! A fantastic gift!

The Obstacles and Rewards of the IB Program

The IB program has a reputation for being extremely tough to get through. This, as with most things, has some truth to it. Every teacher I have is completely open and willing to stop and answer questions, or go over the last bit again, to make sure everything is crystal clear. Finally the IB program is great because it is preparing every one of us for college, the next big educational step. Although I do not have personal experience with it, obviously, the sheer volume of IB graduates who talk about how much easier college is because of IB is evidence that can't be ignored. The stuff that we are learning every day in the IB program is very similar to what college students learn. Just the other day, I performed a chemistry experiment that my teacher, Mr. Koppel, says is being taught to college students all the time. The lesson at the end of the day to be learned from the IB program is that college is doable. All of us take on our work every day, and none of us have drowned under the torrent of notes, been crushed by the weight of projects, or destroyed by the force of homework. If we can accomplish the IB program, we can get through college, no problem. If we get through college, we can be successful in our adult lives. That's what the IB program is about, and that's why all the obstacles are worth getting past.

The Extended Essay is an essay that consists of 4000 words. The student has an entire year to complete the essay and also has a supervisor/teacher to help the student when needed for the essay project. The students will be going to the Auraria Library in June for an Extended Essay workshop. The paper is written over the summer and the final copy is turned in the end of October. The student works with trained faculty. Each supervisor will have 1-4 students. The essay is useful once you get into college.

The overall highlight of the evening came as Mr. Umbach facilitated a conversation with the IB grads as they shared their insights, recommendations and reflections of the IB program and what it has meant to them in terms of their learning, student experience and benefits provided to them with their current universities. The grads shared that while the IB program is challenging and requires a strong commitment of organization and time, they were all involved in extra-curricular activities including participation in sports and clubs and were able to successfully manage their schedules and schoolwork along the way. The grads were in agreement that as part of the IB program they felt a great sense of community and made life-long friendships. They are also all very appreciative of the knowledge they gained as part of the program and are thankful for how well the experience prepared them for college. Many IB grads were able to roll over credits to their universities allowing them to skip general education classes, enter as sophomores or juniors, have a wide selection of grants and scholarships to consider, select a double-major, etc. And, with a high level of academic competition, they felt that their IB diplomas opened the door to the school of their choice. Finally, the IB grads shared some words of encouragement with the 10th grade students to keep in mind while going through the IB program including, "the program provides a broadening of the way you view your life", "use the opportunity to try new things and give everything a chance", "focus on the learning and the learning will provide good grades", "work hard, but be sure to enjoy and savor the experience".
