

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# Coordinator's Corner

~ The Importance of Patience

Past graduates continue to send us videos about the value of their International Baccalaureate experience. I want to draw

attention to the importance of **patience** as it keeps reappearing as a dominant theme in every video and in the conversations that I have with graduates as well as with their parents.

Past graduates attribute their success to the development of habits of excellence, not to singular experiences. I say this with a thorough understanding that the majority of your frustrations and concerns are tied to particular experiences: the upcoming test, the preparation of an oral presentation, the injustice of a teacher, and the mountain of homework that needs to be completed. In the winter months these experiences can pile up and seem all-consuming. And yet, they will not devour you. Piece by piece you address what you can and ultimately develop the techniques and sharpen the skills that you, like so many who came before you, will see as true education.

I do not mean this to sound condescending; I am not saying, "Be patient little ones, it will all work out in the end." I am promoting active patience, the need for you to be aware that every step you take, every

experience that you have contributes to your understanding of who you are and to your ability to decide what you will become. Every time that you consciously realize that the way you choose to respond to a situation not only applies to the particular moment but, more significantly, contributes to your own understanding of who you are; you gain more power over your actions. This type of development applies as much to the development of skills as it does to the creation of character.

The most powerful force in education is invisible in the moment, it can only be seen upon reflection. It is the emerging confidence that you have to handle unknown situations. Every student experiences doubts, frustrations, and moments of overwhelming uncertainty. Year after year, we see student after student triumph despite the self-doubt that accompanies confrontations with the difficult. With the greatest confidence I assure you that such success will be yours.

## What IB Did For Me

I feel that most of the

I am a second year student at Knox College currently pursuing a self-designed major in Religion and Politics and a double minor in Biology and Environmental Studies. My experience in the IB program has been very helpful academically and the distinguishing aspects of the program, like the extended essay and Theory of Knowledge, have been by far the most helpful of these experiences. I submitted my extended essay in world religions alongside my admissions application and it helped me initially establish myself within the

initially establish myself within the department and build relationships with the faculty.

During my first term, I won an award for scholarship for religious studies, in part for my work on campus but also for the interest and initiative I demonstrated with my extended essay. I think the opportunity for self-directed investigation, especially on a subject I wasn't able to explore very deeply in my normal coursework, was vital to help establish my passion and ability to succeed and this has been as helpful, if not more helpful, to me as the practical experience of writing and researching longer essays.

Furthermore, I find that many first year courses designed to introduce students to the intellectual environment of the college are incredibly similar to aspects of TOK and other IB courses. Due to this similarity I was able to acclimate incredibly quickly to academic life on campus and I was able to use this quick acclimation as a selling point to be accepted for off-campus study despite being a freshman. I spent a term at Knox College's Green Oaks Biological Field Station taking an integrated course load covering ecology, biology, geology, art, anthropology/sociology and community dynamics. The interdisciplinary nature

of IB was an aspect of the program that I was able to argue would prepare me for the interdisciplinary program at the field station. Incidentally, two other students (from fifteen total students) were also IB graduates.

Like many other IB graduates, I received enough credit from my diploma to be classified as a sophomore. Thanks to these credits my education plan includes three off campus study experiences (my term at Green Oaks, and a semester each in Jordan and

Scotland next year) and the opportunity to still graduate two trimesters early. Every IB graduate I've met at Knox has had the capacity to study off campus for more than a semester and still graduate anywhere from a term to a year early. These are incidents of success from my first year of college that I have been able to explicitly connect to my education through the IB program.

However, I feel that most of the ways IB helps me succeed academically and personally are much more implicit because my time in the IB program and the

questions asked of me have become foundational for the way I move through the world. Literally just last week I was thinking of a point Ms. Yates made during our reading of The Handmaid's Tale and had a minor breakthrough about Atwood's use of meta- and intratextual humor and how that might connect to the narrator's reticence to share her name.

Though I found the program very difficult while I was in it, every day I become more grateful for these experiences as they enhance my life in small but significant ways.



## News 'n Notes

Let's hear it for our students who qualified for the Boettcher Scholarship from the Class of 2015.

The Boettcher Scholarship is the most prestigious merit-based scholarship available to graduating high school seniors in the State of Colorado. Begun in 1952 by Claude Boettcher, the Boettcher Scholarship was initially modeled after the Rhodes Scholarship Program The purpose of the Boettcher Scholarship is to attract Colorado's best and brightest students to attend college within the state. The Boettcher Scholarship covers the cost of a Scholar's tuition, fees and books for eight semesters/twelve quarters at approved Colorado four-year universities or colleges. A \$2,800 living stipend is also supplied to help defray the cost of room and board. The total amount of the Scholarship depends on a number of factors, including the cost of a Scholar's institution, and can range from approximately \$50,000 to \$160,000.

The Boettcher Foundation awards 40 scholarships annually. Approximately 70 finalists are selected to interview for the Scholarship from an initial pool of applicants, which is typically around 1,700. Since all candidates rank very similar academically, the Boettcher Foundation looks at what the students are doing outside of the school setting that ultimately helps their community, state, or even needy countries. Dr. Steven Fleet opened with a video from two former IB sisters who attended DCHS. They spoke highly of their IB experience and how it had positively influenced their success at the Ivy League universities they are attending. They found the IB program a place where they discovered a safe place to learn and explore new ideas.

The celebration was an occasion to commemorate what the junior class is about to do in the next two years. The presence of friends and family members in the auditorium showed the support of the decisions the students made to the path of the learner profile.

Ms. Yates spoke in depth of how motivation is a true key to success. She said the students would find motivation and hard work included in all aspects of their life.

Each student was asked to write a reflection on someone who was an inspiration to him or her. As an example, Kris Kolbus and her husband were presented with a Certificate of Recognition, Learner Profile: Open-minded: For helping their son, Colin, get to where he is today. The explanation was: "My parents are my backbone. They are always happy to give me advice on my life, and they understand when they need to let go. They know that this is my journey and I sometimes need to be allowed to make my own choices. They have never forced me to do anything I don't want to do, but instead leave that to me. Their open-mindedness to all my mistakes and poor choices no matter how many I make, is what makes them so special to me."

After each student presented their Certificate of Recognition to a parent, sibling, grandparent, teacher or friend, the families and friends enjoyed cake in the North Commons.

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# 2014 B Exam Stats

The IB Diploma, awarded separately from the DCHS diploma, is based on scores from IB subject exams, the Extended Essay, Theory of Knowledge assessments, and the completion of the CAS requirement (creative, action and service hours).

There are also several minimum requirements in these categories, which may keep some students from obtaining the award. For a complete description of the Diploma requirements, see the IB Guidebook on the Huskie IBPO website (www.HuskieIBPO.com).

#### Diploma Scores

For 2014, the average points earned by DCHS IB seniors who received their diplomas was 29 (out of a total of 45 possible points). The highest diploma points awarded to a candidate was 40.

The percentage of DCHS students earning their IB Diploma was 77.3%. This is the highest since 2009.


