Successful Summer Extended Essay Workshop Held at DU

Twenty-eight rising DCHS IB seniors attended the first annual Extended Essay Workshop last June, held at the Penrose Library at the University of Denver. This four-day workshop was sponsored by the Huskie IB Parent Organization, to assist our students in creating a solid first draft of their Extended Essay over the summer, before the hectic fall school session begins.

For those of you not familiar with the Essay, it is a student-driven 4000-word research paper which is a requirement for the IB Diploma. Students work with a DCHS teacher as an advisor, and complete the paper completely on their own, outside of the classroom. At Douglas County High School the final essay is due October 31 of the senior year.

The IBPO engaged Ms. Becky Parnell to conduct this four-day workshop, which she has held for other area IB schools. Ms. Parnell, currently the librarian at Kent Denver, was formerly the librarian at Littleton High School, where she acted as essay advisor for many students, in various subject areas.

The essay process actually began in January, when Ms. Parnell conducted an orientation of the essay for the IB juniors. She also held a session for DCHS essay advisors, sharing many of her experiences and ideas. Students then had the spring to pick a subject area for their essay, choose an advisor, and hopefully, begin narrowing their topic ideas and conduct some preliminary research.

The workshop in June ran over four half-day sessions. On the first day of the workshop, Ms. Parnell provided the students with

a tour of the library facilities. She also used the library's computer training lab to show the students how to explore the library's catalog and additional online databases that are available for use. Students were also provided a DU library card enabling them to use the private university's library facilities and reserve books overnight for subsequent use the following day.

Each day began with a classroom session, during which Ms. Parnell discussed a particular aspect of the essay, and students participated in small-group activities. Students then spent the remainder of the time discussing their topics and research direction one-on-one with Ms. Parnell, and researching sources.

Also in attendance at the workshop was Leah Schultz, DCHS Honors English teacher, who will take over Extended Essay Co-Coordinator duties this coming year (along with Kim Clever). Ms. Schultz took an active role in assisting the students with topic and research discussions, and provided useful assistance to Ms. Parnell. After seeing the students in action and hearing their questions, Ms. Schultz has much enthusiasm for this component of the IB program, and came away with several ideas for improving the process for the students and advisors during the school year.

Coordinator's Corner

As I look through the new curriculum guides for all International Baccalaureate subjects. I see the influence of the recently introduced Learner Profile. International Baccalaureate leaders stated that the Learner Profile would become the driving force behind curriculum, assessment and policy, and they are making good on their promise. In this model, the learner drives decision-making. Educators are fond of saving, generally with the best intentions, that "we do what is best for students." Without a common understanding of how decisions can be energized by student needs, however, such statements too easily give way to what is convenient.

The ten descriptors of the Learner Profile: Inquirers, Knowledgeable, Thinkers, Communicators, Principled, Openminded, Caring, Risk-takers, Balanced, Reflective offer an understanding of characteristics that enable learners to access information, personalize their learning and utilize it for the betterment of others. What I see in the new expectations is subtle but significant. The personalizing

of learning is a step that is all too often ignored in education. New expectations try to bring the learner into the subject by encouraging an activation of personal voice. This expectation is most noticeable in Theory of Knowledge where students are expected to analyze their learning as a means of better understanding themselves and their relation to the world. The activation of voice can be seen in all subjects where reflection upon learning is now an expectation. Students should comfortably acknowledge their own interpretation and how it relates to what they have learned. They should feel comfortable acknowledging what they do not understand as a means of asking the guestions that will lead them further into the subjects that they study.

As a program, we encourage journal writing as a means of reflecting on subject; we offer assignments where students can use their perspectives as the principle tools of exploration. We use discussions in order for students to express their opinions in an open and safe environment. We offer options for stu-

dents to meet many of the criteria of the program. We are fortunate to have a staff that is prepared to listen to the needs of our students.

Parents often ask what they can do to help their children through the rigors of the program. I think that the most important step is to acknowledge the "risktaking" involved in any meaningful educational system and then to engage in honest conversations about how to grow from every experience. Stress arises by seeing education as something outside of the self, as a series of hurdles that seem to be getting higher and higher. Education is more personal than that. Education is about understanding oneself: it resides within oneself and then connects to the outside world. The most important goals that one meets emerge from a strong understanding of the drives, the interests, and the knowledge that one possesses. The self that you interact with in the world is you and the more you interact authentically, with a real awareness of who you are, the more you see and the better you understand yourself.

The Ice Cream Social was held on Thursday, August 16, 2007 at 7:00 p.m. in the North Commons to help welcome the IB freshmen into the programme as well as the school. At the social, IB Council went around and answered any questions concerning the programme that parents or freshmen had while they were enjoying their free ice cream.

Later on, the parents and students split into two groups so more could be accomplished during the remaining hour. The parents followed the IB teachers into the auditorium for a question and answer session while the freshmen remained in the Commons. During that time, IB Council and some of the seniors from the class of 2008 helped freshmen to get to know one another by playing a few ice breakers.

Later, the freshmen were split into three groups where they could ask any of the IB Council members or seniors questions they had about IB. This allowed for shy freshmen to feel less intimidated and ask any questions they had if they didn't earlier that evening, as well as allowed them to learn about the Extended Essay, CAS, IB classes, etc. The Ice Cream social ended with a positive note at 8:30 p.m., when some students stayed to chat with each other before they went home for the evening.

DCHS Extended Essay Workshop at DU

What the Students Thought—

On the final day of the workshop, students were given an opportunity to evaluate the sessions, so we could determine the effectiveness of the workshop.

On a scale of 1-10 (with 10 the highest) students rated:

- overall workshop 8.6
- DU Library research capabilities 8.9
- helpfulness in explaining essay process

When asked if they had a good understanding of what was needed to complete their essay, 22 students said YES: 6 MAYBE.

Best part of the workshop:

- -one-on-one conferencing
- —discussions of the rubrics for grading
- -making the process more understandable
- -receiving little hints and guides
- -just getting started and finding resources

Advice for next year's students:

- —pick a topic and do some research before the workshop
- —choose a topic that really interests you!

Students unanimously said they would recommend the workshop to other students!

A Message from Leah Schultz-

I am often asked the question, "How much will this count toward my grade?" The idea that something has value only when attached to a grade is implicit in the question. It is a struggle to deconstruct this assumption. And, I would be remiss to ignore the obvious inclusion of a grading system in the academic world, but I do believe that if you look at the learner profile of the IBO, you will understand the nature of its philosophy: IB learners are naturally curious people who engage in activities that spur natural curiosity.

Whether willingly in attendance at the summer workshop or under the pressure of Mom and Dad, it was inspiring to see students working hard in the dead of summer. And while some of the attendees have ad-

mitted to not working on their EE since June, 100% of those in attendance have completed their research and 20% already have a rough draft completed. I believe that it was beneficial for these students to be around the academic buzz of other IB students and share in the learning process. They were able to take advantage of a multitude of resources and many of their concerns/fears were quelled during this time.

In talking to this year's senior class candidates, I've been told that the Extended Essay is probably the most elusive and nebulous element of the Diploma Programme. Kim Clever (my EE coordinator partner) and I aim to dispel the confusion that reportedly exists for current students. This task is a delicate one, however, in that

In the next couple of weeks, we will be visiting the TOK class to review expectations and rubrics for the EE and will also answer any questions the students have for their October 31st deadline.

Reflections on the Workshop (the week after...)

What exactly is the Extended Essay? Even after knowing about it for the last couple of years, I still never really understood this "myth." This workshop seemed to make sense of the essay, and Ms. Parnell aided in "demystifying" the process and simply the essay itself. In attending, I found that this essay CAN have direction to it, whereas before, it seemed to resemble a ten-thousand piece puzzle: I mean, where do I even start? And then, where do I go from there? These are issues that I feel I have no longer.

Despite that I may have benefitted more from this workshop had I really started the essay before coming, I feel like it was, in fact, a great place to start. After developing a focused research question, it comes down to the actual research, which is what this workshop most helped me to accomplish. In fact, I do believe I now have all the research I need to complete the entire paper and, with the help of Ms. Parnell, I have devised a plan (an outline) of how I am going to do this.

Another great aspect about the workshop is that it did take place at the Penrose Library (at the University of Denver), where I was able to find sources that I would have never even imagined to find otherwise. For example, I found an entire government document on cults (the focus of my essay is to analyze the motives of the Heaven's Gate cult). So now I'd say that I feel quite "grounded" in my sources: a feeling of assurance it seems.

I would surely recommend that future IB students sign up for this workshop, especially those that feel as lost as I first did. Whether you (as an IB student) haven't even started (although I recommend having a subject and a sense of a specific topic beforehand) or if you believe that you have already finished, this workshop is something worth attending. Simply, try it out. Maybe this "myth," whether this is the essay itself or your specific topic, will seem less foggy.
