
Hybrid, on-line, in-person, asynchronous, quarantined but joining virtually...students engaged from changing environments that made the past year seem both unending and all too short. We endured a year of contradictions when all that we wanted to do rarely aligned with what needed to do. This created an environment where many of us wrestled with the exhaustion that arises from perpetual uncertainty while trying to take the steps to assure a future that far too often seems increasingly obscure as it recedes and taunts us with what we imagined it might have been. And yet every day, and not always with ease, I witnessed the power of smart, determined, good people to persevere as an essential step toward prosperity. In the I.B. students at Douglas County High School I saw the personification of hope. It had a pragmatic side that surfaced when students trusted the science and took the necessary steps of wearing masks and limiting contact with friends in order to mitigate the spread of disease. It had an ethical side as teenagers defied societal labels in order to act in the interest of others. It had a compassionate side as time and time again students supported each other by talking, listening and genuinely caring. Our students represented the best of society by employing knowledge of the virus and using that understanding to make decisions for the greater good. The ability to learn is a prerequisite to becoming moral. For us to live together, for us to operate in a system that is truly "of the people," the people must embrace the behaviors that define the I.B. class of 2021; they must maximize their own understanding in order to find the means to care for one another. No dollar amount of scholarships can ever measure that...but these students are worthy of the greatest rewards.

In Memoriam: Jefferson Dirks



In February the Huskies IB community was rocked by the untimely death of one of its own, Jefferson Dirks.

Jefferson was a member of the IB Class of 2020 and will forever be remembered by his classmates as a kind friend, a wonderful listener, a technical wizard and so much more. Honoring and supporting others was very much part of his nature: for his Eagle Scout project he worked on organizing and restoring the patriotic mural under the Meadows Parkway in Castle Rock. He cheered on his friends, while they were finding their feet during their first year in college during the pandemic, over Zoom calls, with encouraging words and genuine interest in their passions. As he was planning his future, he had decided to take a gap year, and we all knew that there was so much he could do and do it well.

In the words of Dr. Fleet

The loss of any student leaves a hole in the hopes and hearts of their teachers. We have the privilege to come to know them as they learn, as they grow and as they gain confidence in the process of discovering the power they possess to make themselves into the people they want to become. The untimely end, the death, of Jefferson Dirks deprives the world of his kindness, his genuine personality and all of the possibilities of a young life.

I recall Jefferson as he explored interpretations of justice and discussed ideas about the nature of a good life. He converted learning to life. He raised questions and presented possibilities so that he could see where they might go; he built on the ideas of peers so that everyone could see the value of listening and the power of constructing meaning. If his conclusions needed to give

way to new interpretations, he opened his mind to those possibilities. His engagement with ideas, with friends, with teachers and with life modeled a kind commitment to the power of community. Jefferson would be the first to volunteer to help, the first to offer a kind word to someone struggling, and the first to volunteer a perspective to open a discussion. He made the classroom vital and accepting.

I recall Jefferson as we talked during the seven-hour train ride from Prague to Krakow. He talked about his future. He talked about his desire to have a job that enabled him to work with others. He talked about learning more about the history of the world so that he could better understand his place in the world. As he talked, he smiled. He smiled a great deal on that trip and at times he seemed to draw within himself; at times he seemed at one with the world passing by the window, at times he seemed to need a place to withdraw so that he might put it all into some perspective. But, that is the nature of learning. The stillness of the train's interior and the speed of the passing countryside, seems a model for a young mind seeking stability amidst rapid change. We hope that education and our support of one another enables us to find peace amidst uncertainty. I had the great fortune of seeing Jefferson find that peace with his peers and in his school. That is the Jefferson I remember.

The tragedy of Jefferson's death reminds us of our need to remain dedicated to fostering a commitment to listening, caring, acting with kindness, taking risks, dedicating time to others in all of the young minds who trust us; who put their faith in their teachers and their friends, to help them grow; it reminds us that we must keep alive the best of Jefferson Dirks.

Jefferson, may you Rest in Peace.
